## Preparing Tomorrow's Workforce Today

At Cristo Rey Dallas, education goes beyond the classroom. Through the school's signature Corporate Work Study (CWS) program, every student gains real-world work experience while earning \$10,000 toward the cost of their tuition. With 495 students placed among 135+ corporate partners—and with 15 new partners joining this year—the program continues to expand its reach and impact.

According to Anthony Valente, Vice President of Corporate Work Study, CRD students work in industries that represent the backbone of the North Texas economy: law, commercial real estate, healthcare, engineering, construction, energy, financial services and more.

Along with these businesses, CRD partners with more than 35 local nonprofits, with most of the cost of these student placements underwritten by businesses and donors who support

the school's mission. "Students receive tremendous impact from working at nonprofits where they gain behind-the-scenes and boots-on-the-ground experience, while nonprofits welcome students, especially juniors and seniors, who bring with them corporate skills and experience," says Valente. Together with dedicated job partners and nonprofits, CRD is developing Dallas' workforce of tomorrow.

Most job teams consist of two students, down from four, the result of many corporations and businesses moving to hybrid work schedules. This model is more manageable for many job partners and helps ensure that organizations receive

expanding its corporate footprint north into Plano, Frisco and McKinney, and west into Las Colinas, Arlington and Irving. These partnerships solidify Cristo Rey Dallas as a premier workforce readiness program, while creating a future talent pool for a rapidly changing job market.

One of the most exciting pivots has been the integration of artificial intelligence (AI) training into the CWS student curriculum. Valente explains, "With many traditional entry-level tasks being replaced by AI, such as HR chat functions or legal case briefs, CRD students are learning high-value skills that the new workplace demands. From coding and advanced Excel with AI tools to partnering with

companies on real-world projects, students are being equipped with the experience and skills needed to thrive in a future where technology and human insight work hand-in-hand."

For CWS, this school year is defined by two initiatives, the

integration of AI learning into the program curriculum and expanding the program's reach through more of the DFW Metroplex. Both are reshaping the way students learn, work and develop professional work skills.

## On the Road with Crystal Charity

Cristo Rey Dallas is hitting the road in a big way thanks to a capacity-building grant courtesy of Crystal Charity. The grant totaling \$815,136 is funding much-needed shuttle buses for the school's Corporate Work Study (CWS) program and general student transportation, which includes six morning and afternoon pickup locations across the Metroplex.

The Crystal Charity award enables the school to add up to seven, new 15-passenger buses—complete with drivers, logo wrapping and the construction of a protective awning in the school's parking lot. The gift means expansion of CWS routes reaching into Addison, Frisco, Irving, McKinney, Plano and beyond.

Shuttles are a key component of the success of the school and its signature CWS program. On average, shuttle mileage exceeds 750 miles per week, transporting students to and from their work assignments. The new shuttles will add route capacity and help replace older vehicles.





## Learning by Serving: Cristo Rey Students Power Nonprofit Missions

When Cristo Rey Dallas sophomore Saul S. clocks in at Jubilee Park & Community Center, he's not just working at his job placement, he's becoming part of a neighborhood network. "I've had a great experience working at Jubilee," he says. "I love talking to people, especially at the food pantry. The seniors always have something to share, and I learn from the residents and the volunteers every day."

Saul is one of more than 35 Cristo Rey Dallas students placed at non-profit organizations through the school's Corporate Work Study program. Located in Southeast Dallas, Jubilee Park & Community Center is a place-based nonprofit offering holistic, wraparound services to community members.

Jessica Miller-LaSalle, Director of Research, Evaluation and Impact at Jubilee Park & Community Center says the partnership has been transformative. "We assign one student to every department so they get a lot of exposure such as data entry, event prep, the food pantry, answering phones," she explains. "Their help offsets labor costs and saves us countless hours. It allows our staff to focus on deeper-impact work."

From greeting visitors to preparing snack packs for children's programs, students fill roles that are both practical and relational. "Our work hinges on relationships," Miller says. "Having students who can sit with seniors during meals or welcome families at the front desk adds warmth as well as capacity."

For CRD sophomore Saul S., the best part of his job at Jubilee Park is connecting with seniors and hearing about their life experiences.

Beyond job skills, the experience fosters a sense of belonging and service. Miller notes that CRD students show up ready and eager to learn. "They come into a group of established adults, intimidating for anyone, but they handle it with grace. Over time we see them respond to coaching and even mentor their peers."

Saul agrees saying, "I feel freer and more confident doing the tasks I'm asked to do."

For both the students and Jubilee Park, the collaboration is more than work. It's a mutual investment in community and a powerful lesson in the impact of showing up.

CRD teachers and administrators set an example for continued growth and professional development by pursuing advanced degrees, educational travel, professional certifications and more.

## Expanding Impact Through Leadership

**Rosaura Estrada, Math 3 and Engineering Teacher, Math Department Head**

**R**osaura Estrada is steadily transforming her passion for classroom teaching into a broader mission of educational leadership. A dedicated Math 3 and Engineering teacher at Cristo Rey Dallas, she is currently pursuing a Master's of Education in Educational Leadership through the prestigious Remick Leadership Program at the University of Notre Dame. Now entering her second summer of the three-year program, she anticipates graduation in 2026 and is preparing to eventually step into an administrative role at CRD where she can influence learning on a larger scale.

Her leadership journey began with Notre Dame's year-long Latina Educator and Administrator Development (LEAD) program, which equips Latina educators to assume leadership positions in schools. Encouraged by colleagues Emily Lazor and Dr. Nivea Torres, Estrada is embracing the opportunity to broaden her perspective. She quickly recognized that effective school leadership enables her to multiply her impact by supporting both her own students and the teachers who guide them. "Teaching is a learned skill and craft," she explains. "I want to be a teacher of teachers and a lead learner so I can help others be great teachers."

Balancing her responsibilities as a teacher, graduate student, and department head has strengthened her understanding of the challenges CRD students face as they juggle academics, Corporate Work Study responsibilities and extracurricular commitments that may include everything from athletics to school clubs, community service and beyond.

As head of the Math Department, Estrada is implementing strategies learned at Notre Dame, including peer coaching, data-driven instruction, and backwards curriculum design to improve SAT performance. "Ultimately, my goal is to lead leaders," she says, "so that every student benefits from CRD's excellent teaching and supportive school environment."

## Living the Gospel in the Classroom

**Giulio Muci, Freshman Theology/Senior Philosophy Teacher and Theology Department Head**

**W**hen Giulio Muci greets his freshmen Theology students at Cristo Rey Dallas, he often jokes with them about "Who will graduate first?"—they from high school or he from his doctoral program. Behind the humor lies a teacher who is modeling what it means to be a lifelong learner while living out the Gospel message he teaches.

As head of the Theology Department, Muci leads all freshman theology and senior philosophy courses. "I love sitting with freshmen and talking about the Bible," he says. "My goal is to teach students the depth and simplicity of the Gospel as an aid to learning in the classroom and in their personal and family lives as well."

In 2023, Muci began pursuing a Doctorate in Applied Theology at St. Leo University in Florida, flying there each July for summer intensives and completing the rest of the program work remotely. His dissertation explores the relationship between church and state and how Catholic teaching engages with civic life. "The research I'm doing shapes how I build our curriculum and how I prepare students to think critically about faith in society," he explains.

Muci brings a broad perspective to Cristo Rey Dallas. Born in Italy, raised Catholic, then becoming Protestant before returning to the Catholic Church, he easily connects with students of many faith backgrounds. An adjunct college professor as well, he sees firsthand the skills high school students need to thrive.

"I deal with many of the things my students deal with, he says. "I have high expectations for the students, but at the same time I want to extend grace, because I'm in the same position of having to balance many demands and deadlines. I know that life happens."

Married to Julia and father of nearly three-year-old Gabriel, Muci says he leaves school each day "grateful to the Lord for the opportunity" to teach and inspire future leaders.

She says her passion for healthcare was sparked at CRD, where she helped establish the Medical Society alongside science teacher Mrs. Barbara Janiki. Paola says, "She made me want to pursue a career in healthcare."

proudest moments I've had so far is being accepted to the Formula 1 Team with no prior knowledge - just diving deep into research, understanding so many concepts and processes, and realizing I actually knew what I was doing. I was really proud of that." With that same dedication, he became part of the aerodynamics team responsible for designing and building a Formula 1 car, which is currently being prepared for track testing.

Reyna hopes to inspire his community and show students that they too can go to college and acquire knowledge and skills that promote success post-college. He says, "I hope someone says, Hey, there's a Hispanic guy from my community who became a professional in the petroleum industry. So I can do it too."

## Peer Writing Center Building Skills and Inspiring Writers

Over the years, Cristo Rey Dallas has seen remarkable growth across all academic programming, in particular the school's literacy program. Having great educators along with student-led initiatives, literacy has become a true community effort valued and supported across campus.

Long-time Literature teacher, Randal Schmidt is leading the literacy efforts at CRD through the launch of the Peer Writing Center, which serves as a space where students can get feedback on their writing at any stage of the process.

Now in his tenth year at CRD, Schmidt reflects on what makes his role meaningful: "I love that I have the opportunity to be a professional with creative freedom in the curriculum. Being part of the English Department and watching it grow over the years has been really great."

His students get excited when they learn that beyond teaching Senior Literature, AP Literature and Modern English Literature, Schmidt is a published author of short stories and the 2014 novel, *The Lands Beyond the Moon*. "It's fun to share that passion with the students," he says.

The English Department, he notes, takes pride in its teamwork and alignment. Teachers work closely together, ensuring consistency in skills from freshman to senior year. "The curriculum becomes more aligned across the four years, and the teachers start to see the fruits of that labor."

The results speak for themselves. Recently, an alum reached out to Schmidt and said his professor pointed out that he could tell that he had skilled English teachers during high school. "That's not something I take sole credit for because all the teachers here in the English Department

are good. But it was a very, very proud moment hearing from a former student that they feel more prepared than their peers. To me, there's nothing better."

Schmidt highlights the contributions of Zoe Butler, a member of the University of Notre Dame's Alliance for Catholic Education program, who brought new energy to the Peer Writing Center, and senior Jessica M., who stepped into a leadership role to help shape the program.

The Peer Writing Center is open two days a week and provides direct help from a group of peer students who are strong writers. Some tutors are bilingual, which has naturally created a bilingual Writing Center that also supports Spanish Literature classes. "That's been really awesome," Schmidt adds.

Beyond writing, Schmidt sees literacy as central to CRD's mission. "There's a level of professionalism our students develop through literacy and the Corporate Work Study program. They learn to communicate clearly, speak with confidence and engage with adults at such a young age. That's a skill we really nurture in the English Department.

# Champions of Opportunity: Cristo Rey Dallas's Jobs Committee Expands Pathways to Student Success

At Cristo Rey Dallas, the Corporate Work Study program isn't just an innovative model, it's a lifeline. Each job placement helps fund a student's education while building the confidence, real-world skills and professional relationships that change life trajectories. Behind the scenes of this transformative program is the school's Jobs Committee, a dedicated group of advocates recruiting businesses and organizations across North Texas to join the CWS program.

Cristo Rey Dallas Board Member Frank Busch first learned about Cristo Rey from his mother, a board member at the Cristo Rey school in Tucson. With a career as a longtime entrepreneur spanning the U.S. and Mexico, Busch was immediately drawn to the program's focus on self-reliance, determination, and grit; qualities he sees in Cristo Rey Dallas students, most of whom are Hispanic youth seeking to shape a brighter future through opportunity.

Since joining the Jobs Committee, Busch has provided tremendous partner outreach through his own personal and professional networks. "We are changing the trajectory of these kids' lives, and their families' lives," he says, pointing to powerful examples like

alumna Mitzi Serrano, whose hard work as a student and experience in CWS helped earn her a full scholarship to Johns Hopkins University. "It's an absolute pleasure to share these stories with potential Job Partners as we talk about the tremendous results happening on campus."

Working alongside Busch is committee member Fatima Villarreal, Program Manager for Strategic Partnerships on the Workforce Development team at Children's Health. Villarreal first became involved when her employer partnered with CRD and saw firsthand the value students bring to the workplace. "Hands-on work really prepares them not just for college, but for the workforce," she says. One of her recent recruitment successes, facilitating a new partnership with the Greater Dallas Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, resulted in a \$40,000 investment to sponsor an entire student team. "Having been involved as an employer, I can clearly articulate the value and measurable cost savings these students bring to an organization."

The committee's mission is straightforward yet ambitious, to expand CRD's network of Job Partners throughout North Texas

and across a wide range of industries, from healthcare and logistics to banking and real estate. Economic uncertainty can make recruiting new partners challenging, but the message remains compelling: CRD student workers are the future of Dallas' workforce, ready to return as skilled, career-ready professionals.

As Villarreal puts it, "In a competitive talent market, planting the seed early is everything."

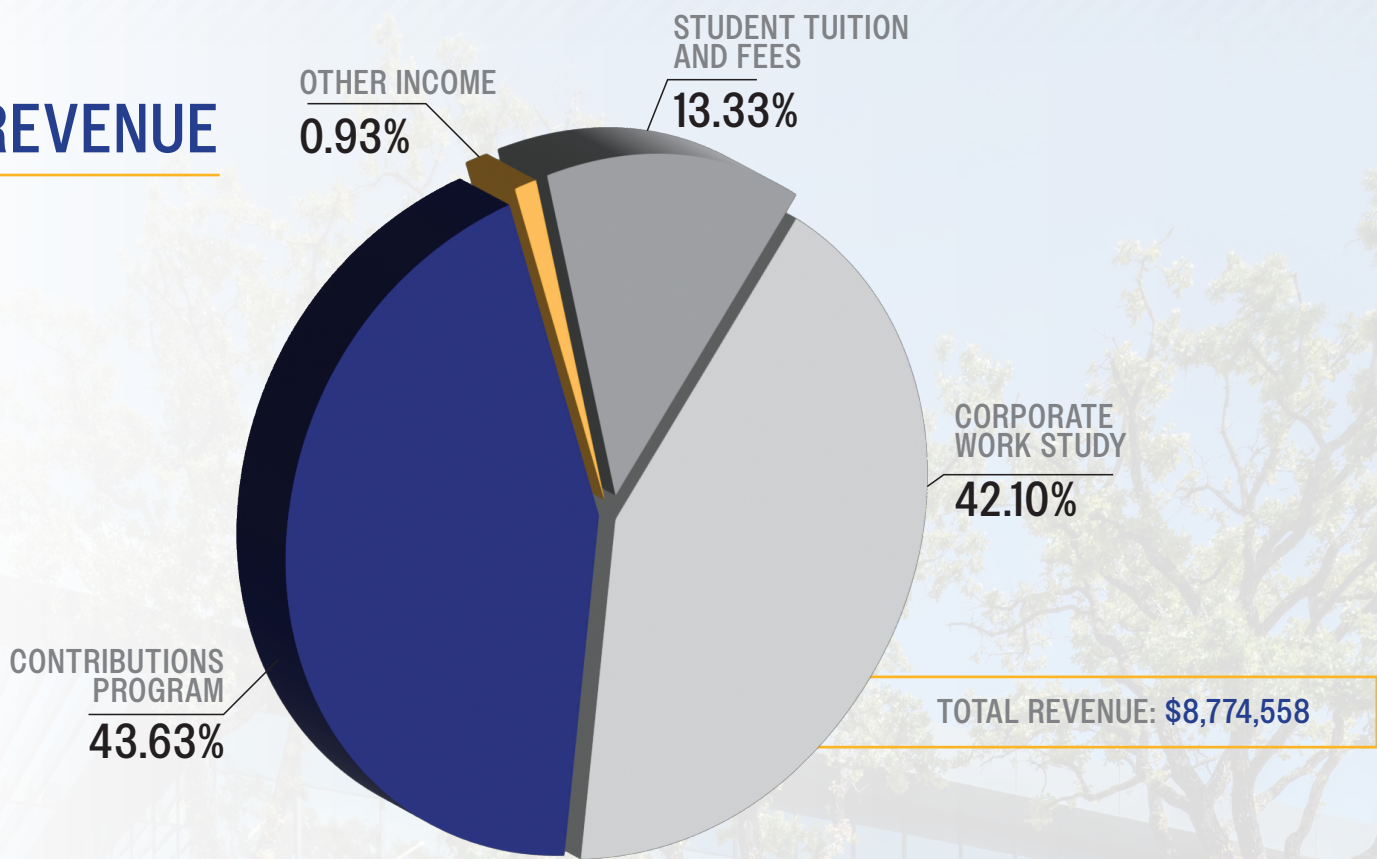

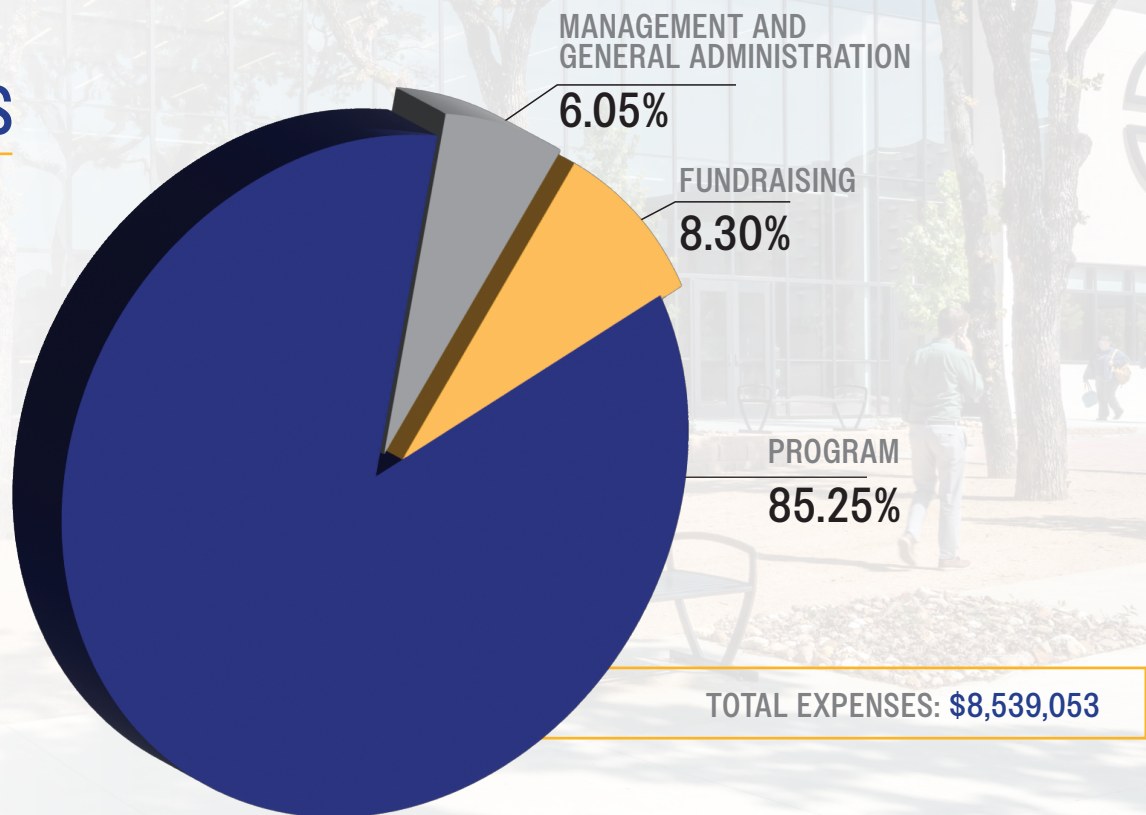

**B**arbara Moroney remembers how she and her husband Jim, found their way to Cristo Rey Dallas. “Jim actually got there first,” she laughs. “He supported the School’s first capital campaign that raised funds for the Academic Center. My first visit to campus was for the opening of the Academic Center, and I was impressed from the start.”

Along with encouragement from her husband, Barbara was inspired to learn more about CRD through Jeanne Whitman, a longtime friend who shared stories about the school’s mission, its innovative Corporate Work Study program and its commitment to providing education, skills and opportunity to hardworking high school students.

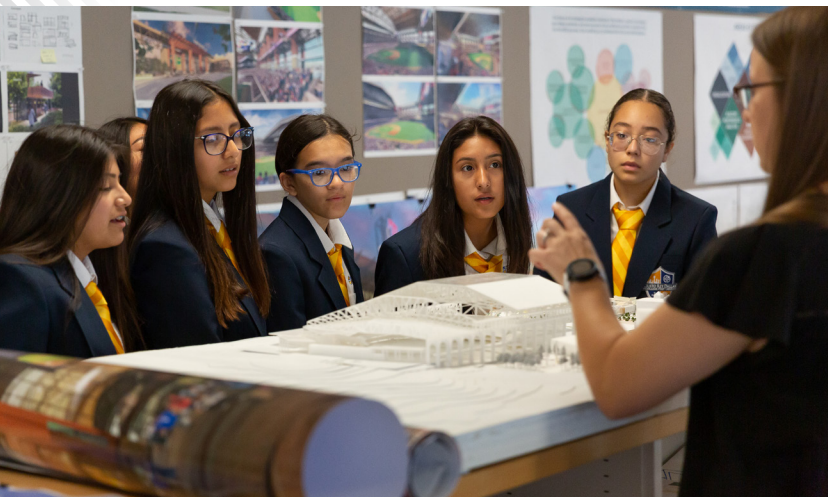
